






Belle Meade

The famous Belle Meade Plantation is a historic mansion turned museum that stretches over 30 acres and is home to years of Belle Meade history dating back to 1807. Belle Meade has one of the highest incomes per capita in the United States.







Crieve Hall

Crieve Hall, located about 15 minutes from south of downtown, is a neighborhood that is literally "steeped" in history. It was the home of Joel Cheek, the founder of Maxwell Coffee in the late 1800's. The name "Crieve Hall" comes from the name given to the mansion that belonged to Joel Cheek's daughter and her husband. The neighborhood we know today is land that had been subdivided in the 1950's to make way for a residential neighborhood after the mansion went into foreclosure. Here you will find great ranch homes on nice size lots and you may even find an amazing mid-century modern gem. With great proximity to both downtown and Cool Springs, it's the ideal location for those commuting to those areas.



Downtown Nashville




Midtown

Green Hills






West Meade




Hendersonville

In addition to the surrounding school districts, Middle Tennessee offers a variety of reputable opportunities for those looking to pursue higher education.


